Gerald is currently Merit Awards Officer as well as Area Representative for the Western Region. Gerald's Vice President nomination is for Phillip Dove LRPS, CPAGB, Portfolio Secretary and Southern Area Representative — An excellent team. The next 2 years are in safe hands.

Looking back I have been honoured to wear that chain of office as President since April 2022. Twenty Four months where many changes have occurred both large and small and sometimes easily forgotten. The majority having significant positive benefits which continue to evolve into best practices as we go forward.

Unfortunately, there has also been negatives, we have lost some great friends including an icon of regional photography; Stan Bewick to whom Tynemouth Photographic Society and the NCPF owe a great deal for his work.

We are also down on clubs. In 2022, we had 48 clubs and are now down to 43 with sad likelihood that another small membership club, West Cumbria Photo Group is likely to fold.

But during this 24 month period, you will note our NCPF Executive Officers and sub-committee teams positively driving and evolving our Federation with, for example:

- 41st International Salon with FIAP, PSA and GPU endorsement managed successfully, PayPal set up and a new website created. Exhibition, Catalogue and medals distributed and all by a small team despite last minute personnel reduction due to illness. Loss of system software provider being the final straw that unfortunately ended our Salon presence.
- NCPF Club Championships and Annuals. Back to better than pre-Covid entry numbers by clubs. Massive effort by the team, redrafting rules plus all the supporting spreadsheets and the entry method making the system smoother and easier to not only enter, but also to interrogate for fast distribution of results.
- Changes to those competition rules encouraging new and fresh work by removing access to those "well known" images that have previously won certificates (Annuals), or work that has previously been entered (forthcoming Club Championships).
- Financial support to those clubs representing NCPF at PAGB Inter Federation Competitions with £100 per club, per competition awarded.
- Removal of bad custom and practice, where NCPF Executive provided raffle prizes from their own pocket.
 Prizes now purchased and receipted.

I'm doing a photographic project which has been going on for sometime documenting the changes in the town which are quite exciting. I think so anyway.




Out with the old in with the New

TV Weather Pictures

This brief guide is based upon my own experiences of supplying images to both the BBC and Tyne Tees television stations, to be used by them as weather pictures.



For me this started out a couple of years ago as just something to do, and I have had a few accepted over the years.

Its a chance to contribute, and as Andy Warhol once said in the 1960's every one will have a 15 minute claim to fame, or as in this instance not 15 mins but about 45 seconds.

Both stations require full size images at 150 dpi and won't accept watermarks on the actual image, e.g. such as the photographers name.

But both stations do display on screen both your name and the location where the image was taken when the image is shown. Both the BBC and Tyne Tees require that the image was taken on the day it was submitted to them, so as to accurately reflect the weather of that particular day. Tyne Tees prefer that the main subject is on the right hand side or the centre of the image because their weather presenters tend to stand on the left hand side of the screen. The BBC don't have any stipulations in that respect.

Both stations require images submitted to them by email as early on the day as you can, preferably no later than lunchtime.

Include your name, and make sure to include the information relating to where and when the image was taken.

At this point I should mention that neither company pay for the use of your images, its just a bit of fun.

However, my experience has shown it can often unintentionally lead to other things.

Personally, I don't particularly look to sell images or prints of my work but through this limited exposure I have sold both. I have also had enquires to use some of my Northumberland and Weardale images from a best selling author who's detective novels are always located in the northeast of England.

Recollections of the Queen's Coronation in 1953

About midnight a friend and I walked to Whitehall, a chosen place to spend the night before the Coronation and see the parade. The pavements were filling and some settling down for the long night. Little happened over night but very early on the day the Police had us on our feet to make more space as the pavements filled.

Whitehall was closed to traffic so those making their way to the Abbey walked. Dressed in fine uniforms or morning suits, all were cheered by the crowd. I don't recall any women. The greatest cheers went to the last before the possession, the road sweepers with little barrows. Between sweeping they took their bows, and the crowd loved it.



Almost six feet six in my shoes, I was used to people pushing ahead of me so chose a narrower bit of pavement and settled for the back. The Police had confiscated anything they thought people might have brought to stand on, but I had a rectangular ex-army rucksack and had lined it with wood to stand on and lean against the wall.

People had been standing for hours so naturally some fainted. As the time approached the rate at which people were being stretchered away increased, just minutes before the procession reached us a young woman I had come to know pleaded with me not to let them take her away if she fainted. The morning was wet with some heavy showers and a lasting memory is the Queen of Tonga in an open carriage. It was rumoured that she had refused to have the hood put up. The crowd roared in appreciation.


Recently I was sharing this memory with daughter Carolyn who likes Sky News. Shortly after she texted me an extract from that day's with a photograph of Queen Salote Tupou III of Tonga in the open carriage and reminding us of her refusal to have the hood up.

I have never done anything like this before or since, but it was a memorable experience. The lined rucksack worked well and the young woman referred to was able to stand on it as well.

To gain experience I had taken a residential job in London for about a year. I did a lot of walking and the street decorations for the coronation added to the enjoyment. My photograph below shows the entrance to Selfridges store on Oxford Street featuring the two Elizabeths. The panel on the left is about QEI, 1558 with her portrait centre about the effigy of our Queen Elizabeth, and the right-hand panel is devoted to QEII, 1953.



The effigy shows the Queen in uniform, mounted and riding side-saddle as seen in my first photo of her on The Mall returning from Trooping the Colour on Horse Guards Parade four days after the coronation. She is followed by the Duke of Edinburgh. This became an iconic image of her widely used, especially in colour because she was wearing a red tunic.

In the 1950s I did not know anyone who shot colour. Incidentally, both my parents saw six monarchs but it looks as though I will have to settle for five.

For anyone interested I was using an 8on roll film camera, a folding Zeiss Icon. Not short on quality, but after an exposure you watched for the next number in a little red window while winding on, just like an early Brownie.



The job was assistant warden and club leader at the PM Boy's Club in Victoria, and most days I walked along Buckingham Palace Road and the length of The Mall to their base in Trafalgar Square.

My final photo shows me about to leave the job in August 1953. The bike is an Ariel 500. Hard helmets were not worn in those days. I had a close-fitting leather one. I would not wish to live in London but working there for a year was brilliant.



Brooks Falls, Alaska. Olympus OM1 40-150 f/2.8 at 106mm (212 35mm equivalent). 1/2500 @ f/2.8 ISO 320.

Brooks River is famous for coastal brown bears fishing its waterfalls during one of the salmon runs and we were lucky to visit in early August when there were up 30 bears at a time feeding on the thousands of fish swimming upstream to spawn. Bears "negotiate" with each other for their places to stand with the dominant animals getting the prime spots.

The photographic difficulties were isolating a clear view of a single bear, not "blowing" the white water, and timing the shot with the fish about to be caught in the limited amount of time with good light. For this, the Olympus "Pro Capture" mode (which buffers up to about 90 full-resolution raw files continuously on a half-press of the shutter, before writing them all to the card when the shutter is fully pressed - at up to 100 frames per second) felt like cheating! The problem was sifting through many thousands of "nearly" images. I agree that the fish do look "photoshopped-in", but they aren't - honest.

They say if life gives you lemons – make lemonade. But if life gives you lockdowns...

It's amazing how our memories of lockdown are already a bit fuzzy, like those pixelated images of people on the TV who prefer to remain anonymous. 'Did that happen in the first lockdown...or the second...or was it when we were in tier-three? Three vaccinations each later and we can't recall. Apart from that infamous moment back in March 2020 when the PM appeared on TV looking uncharacteristically solemn. 'Stay at home'.

That bit's burned on our minds. Although at the time our immediate concerns were for our loved ones' health (not to mention our own) the instruction was particularly difficult to swallow because photographing in southern Africa, as well as leading tours there, is front and centre of our photography business. Home has been little more than a pit-stop for the last 20 plus years.

What on earth were we going to do? We had a full programme of photo trips to deliver in just a few short weeks. All those contractual obligations to guests. Last time we looked there were no free-ranging elephants in the British Isles. We'd been building momentum nicely with our safaris; we even had our first stand at the NEC's spring Photo Show booked — until that was cancelled last minute too, just days before the PM's briefing.

With no end to the pandemic in sight, and our trade-stand furniture and banners stashed under the bed to gather dust we were anxious about survival on all fronts. The only consolation came when loo roll was scarce. We'd finally have a use for all those brochures we'd had printed.

But if learning to make it as freelance, pro wildlife photographers has taught us anything over the years it's to adapt fast to sudden change. We quickly booked our guests onto re-scheduled trips for the following year, grateful for their continued support in team Toon. We didn't realise then, of course, we'd be performing the very same admin juggling act the following year; rolling trips forward yet again as virus levels yo-yoed, new variants emerged, and African travel stayed stuck at the traffic lights.

Safaris mothballed, we hit the phone to magazine editors early in the spring of 2020. Our first jobs as journalists have always been relevant to us in our second careers as photographers and it was the same during the Covid-19 lockdowns. With almost all our income streams dried up, we would, at least, have more time for the conservation photojournalism we enjoyed doing to raise awareness of the many complex and pressing environmental issues impacting our subjects.

What better time than lockdown, when we all became more aware of the natural world's importance, to champion the best of a planet currently held on pause?

Thankfully we have a large back catalogue of images to draw on and perhaps more importantly, a thick contacts book. We banked on the fact that at least some magazines would be keen for feature ideas when little new photography stuff was rolling across their desks. At least homeworking - new to many in the pandemic era— was second nature to us.

Other Covid novelties like Zoom demanded a much bigger adjustment. But if we could no longer get out into the world; the world was going to have to come to us. Our boxroom, the smaller of our two home-offices, got a speedy makeover and was kitted out with some smart new LED panels on posh stands to trick us into believing

We were soon giving talks from a pokey old back bedroom to camera groups and conferences around the globe. While we really missed the connection with a live audience when everything migrated online; we came to value how the virtual new world order helped us all stay connected. An invite to speak at a major US photo convention, for example, would not have come our way pre-Covid. Our expenses' bill on air fares alone would have been a deal-breaker.

But what of our photography itself? It's not just an itch we've got to scratch — as professional photographers, images are our bread and butter. We couldn't just shove our camera gear under the bed next to the trade-stand boxes. We still had stock libraries to supply with material, however meagre the returns, we still needed images for magazines and we still had to feed the hungry social media machine to keep our names out there. Luckily that first spring we were blessed with some great weather. It seemed as if all the small birds in Northumberland National Park chose to nest in our garden.

We kept the photography rust at bay during that first strict lockdown with humble back garden subjects – always popular with rural lifestyle and natural history magazines. Articles about making your patch more wildlife-friendly might not have been ground-breaking in terms of the photography required to illustrate them, but any small thing we could do to improve the situation for struggling species made our Covid-captivity more palatable.

Then as the weeks passed, as our hair grew untidily long, we expanded to photograph the nearby local verges, being managed by the Wildlife Trust for wildflowers, as well as the beautiful, traditional hay meadows in our area. These were now peaking along the routes where we took our permitted daily exercise. Warm afternoons photographing in meadows alive with bees and blooms were halcyon days indeed. You could almost forget for a while what was going on in the world. We suddenly realised, after nearly 14 years living in the place, we were finally getting down to documenting our wider backyard. Something we'd discussed and planned many times, but never seriously got round to.

As the restrictions slowly lifted so our photographic boundaries for this self-styled 'project' to record the wildlife and wild habitats of our national park extended. It provided us with just the excuse for a domestic safari or two



during pandemic summers cruising around the backroads and quiet tracks of our sleepy surrounds in search of good subjects.

We were soon finding breeding curlews in the heathers and bog cotton, shy hares in the hay meadows, grazing deer and at one point a fox den with some very energetic and playful youngsters.

Batting away the midges, we told ourselves how lucky we were to have access to these photo opportunities when so many people were stuck in crowded towns and cities.

It was a time for trying new things (no-one was watching!) including tiptoeing briefly into landscape photography. We explored many scenic corners of the park at a time when tourists were scarce to encapsulate the upland eco-system we were documenting.

We also experimented with creative techniques we were just starting to use more in our nature photography – things like DCM and panning with slow shutter speeds - to keep our skills sharp. And we challenged ourselves to 'capture' a small local wood, minutes from our house, in a

wide variety of different ways, visiting daily in the lockdown at times. It's always been our view that the more you return to a place that's precious to you the better your images.

We valued and soaked up and photographed our local surroundings like never before. But despite the soothing, tranquil sanctuary of our home environment, deep down, we were pining for Africa. On the furthest horizon, beyond the uplands of our lockdown confines, was a distant green light that would signal the return to our beloved 'old normal'. In truth it was all we could really focus on.

Competition Secretaries

Best Practice Checklist and Judges Comments Form.

In my time as NCPF President I have been incredibly fortunate having have been invited to visit multiple clubs for judging, lecturing and for the really enjoyable task of presenting both special and club awards:

One factor that continues to impress me as "always being the same" throughout the Federation is the open and friendly greeting and efficient running of the evening by each clubs President, committee and members. Thank you.

However: Some differences do occasionally appear regards planning and post meeting communications.

Though not trying to regiment or dictate how each of our unique and different clubs work, Stephen Fowler on behalf of the judges sub-committee has created a "Competition Secretaries Checklist" to go along with the existing "Good Practice Guide for Club Programme and Competition Secretaries" all available on NCPF website.

Competition Secretaries Best Practice checklist

(also relevant for booking Lecturers)

When booking a Judge please advise.

- o Date, time and location
- o In person or on-line meeting
- o Will the meeting be shared/recorded on-line
- o Type of competition, e.g. inter-club, club, prints, PDIs, prints and PDIs
- o Estimated number of entries
- o Marks, written comments, placings requirements
- o Estimated expenses and any special requirements

Upon acceptance

- o Confirm booking in writing by email or post
- o Send out club confirmation form if used

When images are available

- o Contact the judge to confirm when convenient to deliver prints or transfer PDIs
- o Confirm marks, written comments, placings requirements
- o Confirm number of entries and expected running time
- o Provide exact definition of set subject constraints if appropriate
- o Presentation sequence, e.g. winners at the end in reverse sequence
- o Confirm if results are required beforehand and if so when and how
- o Provide a map/Sat Nav details to find the location and where to park
- o Provide a mobile phone number the judge can use to contact the club in unforeseen circumstances

Competition Secretaries

Best Practice Checklist and Judges Comments Form.

Competition Secretaries Best Practice checklist cont.

On the night

- o Welcome the judge and provide assistance to carry in any print boxes etc.
- o Ensure the judge is comfortable with the layout of the room and where to stand
- o Ensure the judge is comfortable with any microphone, pointing devices etc.
- o Provide the judge with a drink of water
- o Confirm the expected timing and when refreshments will be served
- o Ensure that the judge's expenses are paid without having to be asked for
- o Ensure you know the judge's name, distinctions, club etc. for correct introduction
- o Confirm if the club will announce author's names after comments have been given
- o On completion, ensure that an appropriate vote of thanks is given
- o Ensure that the judge is provided with complimentary refreshments

After the event

- o Thank the judge in writing by email or post
- o Suggest that the club completes and submits a Judge's Comment Form

Comment form for Clubs and Judges

In addition: There is also a feedback system between Clubs/Judges and the Judges Sub-Committee. This involves using a standardised "Comment Form" which both clubs and judges are invited to complete in order to identify and help improve:

- Areas of judges training/advisory needs:
- Individual judges who may merit promotion and/or
- Lapses in the observance of booking protocols.

The comment form available <u>here</u>, can be completed on behalf of the Trustees and Members of a club, signed and returned as an e-mail attachment greatly helping the NCPF Judges sub-committee by providing first hand feedback.

Another great resource is of course a proper handover between outgoing and new members of committee, with useful documents and offer of support while the new committee member gets to grips with the new role. A job description is always of use as is the requirement to check and double check competition rules.

With significant help from Phillip Dove and Alan Parker from Saltburn PS our entry format has changed significantly, the latter not requiring a club entry form images identified by club codes instead.

Benefits of change were proven in the recent Club Championship where all results were distributed in less than 24 hrs. A potentially difficult tie break also being resolved despite going to the 10th image to confirm winner.

You will also note changes to re-entering of "seen-before in same competition" photographs. For:

- "Annuals" requiring work that has not previously won any award or certificate.
- Next "NCPF Club Championship" shall only accept photographs that have not been previously entered.
- Work that is the same or similar will also not be allowed as i.e. Prints and then copied across to PDI's.

Reasoning is to encourage new and fresh work. Although each seen before image is marvellous in its own right, re-entering of photographs that consistently do very well do not encourage new work or add to entertainment.

It was a full house for the NCPF Club Championships at Clara Vale on Sunday 11th February 2024, with the kitchen and hall well utilised and groups of people making and re-meeting friends from across our region, while everything was well prepared by the NCPF team who had been on site from 8.30am setting up.

In fact, "setting up" had progressed in the background for at least 5 months prior to the big day, with a re-draft of the rules endorsed by the Competitions Sub-Committee and simplified adverts and invitations distributed to all 43 of our NCPF clubs.

Another significant planning pre-event was the review of our spreadsheet marking and recording system, which had a total re-write. This served us very well on the day, allowing a potentially difficult tie-break to be managed easily, and with full competition results plus individual club results distributed to entrant clubs, and the club results being on the NCPF website, all in less than 24 hours.

Photographic work for the 24 clubs who entered were split into Projected Digital Images first, followed by Prints. Prints being shown to judges on a lightbox while also being displayed as full PDI's for the audience.



ObituaryStan Walls APAGB



It is with deep regret that I announce the passing of Stan Walls APAGB of South Shields Photographic Society who passed away in the early hours of Saturday morning 11th March 2023 at the age of 95 years young.

Stan became a member of the Society on the 5th December 1955, he was elected to the committee in 1960. Stan worked for Lloyds Bank by profession, so it was no surprise that he was elected to serve as Treasurer which he did from 1964 until 2015, some 51 years, during which time he also held the office

of Vice President 1971 to 1975 and President 1976 to 1978 and in recognition of his long service to the society he was awarded Honorary Vice President in 1983.

He was also honoured by the Photographic Alliance of Great Britain with APAGB for "Meritorious Service to Photography" which was presented to him by Jane Black ARPS, FPSA, Hon. PAGB at a weekly meeting of the society in October 2000. He was further honoured by the Society in 2002 when Honorary Life Membership was bestowed on him, which is the highest honour the society can award to any of its members. In 2015 his 60-year membership was commemorated with presentation of an engraved plaque to mark the occasion.

He was an active member, taking part in club competitions in his early years of membership having owned 35mm film cameras by Practika, Yashicamat, Microcord, Microflex ½ plate camera, and including a Canon A1 and a Bronica ETRS, a Medium Format roll film camera, producing Lantern Slides and monochrome prints, even the odd colour print from time to time. Not standing in the way of progress, he did dabble a little in digital photography but never became fully involved with it.

His greatest love was ballroom dancing, long before it became fashionable thanks to "Strictly Come Dancing". He was a credited teacher and a judge and along with his wife Margaret they both travelled up and down the country at weekends attending competitions etc. His other love was snooker, which he enjoyed with visits to a snooker club in South Shields where he was a member.

Sadly, we never saw Stan on the resumption of meetings after the pandemic, his health was beginning to deteriorate just before the "lockdown" and took up residence in a nursing home along with his wife Margret during the pandemic.

He will always be remembered for his charismatic personality, his humour and most importantly for his friendship.

ObituaryStan Bewick AFIAP, APSA, APAGB



It is with great sadness that we report the passing of Stan Bewick on the night of 7th – 8th July 2023. Stan joined Tynemouth Photographic Society in October 1957 and was quickly recognised as a valuable member.

He was Secretary for 5yrs, 1969 - 73, President from 1974 - 76, Treasurer 2006 - 07, and prints competitions secretary from 2008 - 10.

For 25yrs he was our syllabus secretary and until a couple of years ago ran the weekly raffle and was the checker of our annual accounts.

Stan was made a life member of Tynemouth PS in 1986.

He was a very good photographer, taking both slides and negatives long before digital came in. He was one of the first members of Tynemouth to make his own 20 x 16in Cibachrome colour prints.

Another member at that time had a fully automated Cibachrome system set up at home, and made superb prints. Stan told me that if he could get prints to such quality, he could beat the other member on composition — which he did eventually, with his manual system. Even at that time however he was aware that these were produced using 'awful chemicals.'

Regarding the NCPF (Federation). In 1971, Stan became a member of the Federation executive committee, being elected from the floor. In 1972, he became the first editor of the Federation Newsletter – 'Northern Focus' - and then became their secretary for 5 years in 1976. 1984 saw Stan take the helm of the Federation, as President for two years, and for many years he played a very active role to the Federation in other capacities. He served on various sub committees and was their Archivist until he retired from that role just a few years ago. In the 1990s he chaired the Federation Centenary Committee, making sure that the celebrations were memorable and worthy and he himself produced the Federation Centenary Handbook.

Stan liked to keep up with technology, but never bought new equipment just for the sake of it – indeed he was quite frugal. As far as I recollect however, he was the first member of our club to buy a digital camera – a Pentax compact. (He was a dedicated Pentax SLR user.) Very generously, he offered to loan it to me for a Swiss holiday, insisting that I took it. (I was still taking slides.) I was scared stiff!

I recall that he demonstrated an early version of Photoshop to members and produced a picture of a Tynemouth landscape, which included a rowing boat and boatman dropped in from a slide taken in Staithes. We were amazed. He gave several demonstrations in the early days of digital and almost worshipped the work and tutorials of Barry Thomas.

In honour of his work to the Federation, in 2003 Stan was given the accolade of the first NCPF Honorary Life Vice President. This was for exceptional service to the Federation, and according to the rules, included at least 40yrs club membership.

He had numerous acceptances in International Exhibitions, such that he was able to gain his AFIAP.

As keeper of our own archive, Stan set about digitising and recording our large collection of glass plates, slides, and negatives. These now number over two thousand.

About three years ago he decided, without telling our club members, that we should produce a book showing archive pictures based on the Old Borough of Tynemouth. He took on the task alone except for asking Dorothy and I to vet the pictures and proofread the script. This book was published in November 2021 and has been a good seller, generating along the way a useful sum for our club funds.

We are immensely proud that Stan stayed with Tynemouth PS for all these years. He was an exceptional servant to this club and the wider Photographic community.

In April 2019, as my last duty in the role as TPS President at the time, I was proud and honoured to award Stan the position of our first Honorary Life President.

18th of March 2023 was the 120th Anniversary of Tynemouth Photographic Society and we celebrated with a lunch. Stan attended that, and for that special occasion, and as a keepsake for members who attended the event, he produced for us a booklet of a condensed history of the Society.

In our Society, until just last year, he was well known for bringing in large bags of delicious home-grown tomatoes, which he enjoyed handing out to members.

Stan was a good friend to me, as well as being a fount of knowledge on all things regarding the NCPF and Tynemouth PS. Dorothy and I, other club members and many in the wider photographic community will miss him tremendously.

Stan passed away peacefully in his sleep, in hospital. He has a brother, Dennis in North Shields, and a niece Amy in Darwin Australia. His sister Brenda and David his nephew live in the USA. All were coming together in Whitley Bay to celebrate his 90th Birthday on July 14th. We pass on our deepest condolences to them and are grateful that Stan chose a life with photography, and TPS in particular, as his hobby.

Sad demise - by Joe Finlay

<u>Sunderland Photographic Association 1888 – 2023</u>

Twelve citizens of Sunderland met in October 1888 and agreed to form a photographic society. The first meeting was 16 October 1888 when it was stated that 40 members had enrolled. The subscription was five shillings (£0.25).

The Association has operated continuously since, joining the Northumberland and Durham Federation (now the NCPF) in 1908 and over the years providing considerable support, with Sunderland member W Milburn NCPF President from 1910 – 1922 followed by another Sunderland member R Chalmers from 1922-1944.

In more recent years Bill Hornsby, Bert Snell and Cliff Banks have all served as President. Many others have served in other positions and on its sub-committees.

Sunderland PA and its members have had considerable success in NCPF competitions over the years and have won many trophies. However, it is probably unique in having lost a trophy. In 1949 during a change of premises it was realised that the Corder Trophy, which the Association had won earlier in the year, was missing. It was never found and a donation of £5.00 was made to the NCPF towards the cost of a new trophy.

Colour photography arrived in Sunderland in 1898 when its president William Milburn projected 12 colour slides although it was 1941 before colour slide competitions were introduced. The first lady members arrived in 1912 and these were soon achieving success in exhibitions including the RPS. In 1935 Robert Chalmers was not only President of Sunderland PA but also the NCPF and the RPS.

The Association's membership fluctuated over the years and by its centenary in 1988 had to be restricted to 100 to comply with the insurance requirements of its premises.

Since then there has been a steady decline in members eventually resulting in the end of internal competitions. Despite this, it has continued its support for the NCPF and only a few years ago 5 of its 20 or so members held positions with the NCPF or were on its sub-committees. It was realised in February this year that next season its membership would be in single figures and the sad decision was taken to bring the Association to an end.

By Editor: A sad day indeed, but what history, looking at those famous names who not only left their mark on photography, but are part of our NCPF history.

Joe advises: Write-up, is partially based on a booklet written by Bert Snell and Bill Hornsby for the Sunderland Photographic Association centenary in 1988.

Scanned from the same booklet are some photographs. They were obviously very formal in 1988.

The photographers names are





In March 1973 Brian Wright chaired the inaugural meeting in Whickham Community Centre and we have been meeting there ever since. The photograph of The Tyne at Dunston was made by Brian in the year the Club was founded, and he himself attended until a few years ago.

Called Whickham Camera Club, following the silver jubilee it was renamed Whickham Photographic Club. Membership has been in the 40s or 50s, occasionally the 60s until a post covid fall off.



Our longest standing active member is Thomas Cook who has been with us throughout. Tom, an Hon. Vice-President for life is now in his 90's.

In the early years Tom held office and at one time young Tom was a junior member. As well as friendly good humour he is noted for buying up what some see as junk at the annual auctions, making a generous contribution to funds.



Our other Hon Vice-President is Trevor Ermel who attended the inaugural meeting and was exceptionally active holding most offices. Trevor is still on the books and maintains an interest but many years ago moved to live at the coast. Roy Elwood is the only Hon. President, a position created for him.

Inter-club success Whickham has always engaged with the wider club movement and by the third year won the South Tyne Area Slide Trophy. This and the Print Trophy have been held a good many times. We were keen supporters of the 'Hexham Knock-out' held in the Queens Hall, now the NCPF Club Championship.

In 1988 we were one of the two clubs to represent the Northern Counties at the Photographic Alliance of Great Britain (PAGB) Inter-federation slide challenge held at Warwick (photo team Whickham enjoying ice-creams). Whickham started as a strong slide club but interest in print making grew and in 1999 we were invited to represent the Northern Counties Federation at the first PAGB national print challenge and came third. We were not, however to become one of the 'high flying' clubs at these events. More than a couple of decades ago the individual battles

with other clubs gave way to exchange evening when a club team would present a range of work. This proved more rewarding than just seeing what each club considered their best work and opened it up to members who were producing interesting stuff but not perhaps high scoring.

Outings At one time there were two coach trips each season, Yorkshire or the Borders in Spring and The Lakes in Autumn, also during the closed season for meetings there were weekly Friday evening walks finishing in the Swalwell Social Club, together with occasional day trips.

in 1981 (see tank engine photo that is Aviemore not Tanfield). In 1989 and 90 there were week-long group photoholidays to Stoer (see Durness photo).

Tanfield is still visited most seasons and usually attracts a good turnout. Fairly regularly there were all-day trips to the Farne Isles to photograph sea birds and at times landing on the Bass Rock when the gannets were nesting. Currently the club does not organise outings but encourages individual members to do so.



Major project – St Nicholas's Cathedral A few years ago the Cathedral secured a multi-million pound grant for a major refurbishing including replacement of the pews, relaying the ledger stones and a new stone floor. The Club was given the opportunity to document the project with very full access during the twenty months that it was closed to the public. It reopened August 2021. On 25th Oct. the Cathedral was delighted to welcome members of Whickham Photographic Club (L).



Annual Exhibition established About two decades ago frustration at not having found a venue for an annual exhibition reached a peak and what was established as a compromise became a highlight of the season. Support has been immense with all members showing in the first year and some very good turnouts since. The prints were supported by projected images and this has continued as has the format of a pre-view evening with invited guests on the Friday evening and a public showing on the Saturday. It has remained a

non-competitive event with members showing work of their choice.

The club has held four framed exhibitions; at Gibside, twice at Saltwell Towers and at the redundant Church nearby that was taken over by a photographic couple. Members have also shown their work including a joint venture by ten members who put on a show at La Boca art café in Newcastle (photo left). In 2008 all members were invited to pre-view Roy Elwood's 'Retrospective: Sixty years of Photography' at Newcastle Arts Centre, one of many shared and solo exhibitions Roy has taken part in. The Club exhibition out of the Community Centre was hung in the Cathedral in May 2019 (see photo right).

Whickham Library

We have long enjoyed a cooperative relationship with the Whickham Library, both when under Local Authority management and with the voluntary group that now runs it. Portable display boards were supplied and about three dozen prints shown. More recently prints have been displayed longer term above the book shelves, perhaps more than a bit high for the vertically challenged.



Recently the meeting room has been converted into a warm lounge. The long wall has a series of bays that have been fitted with trellis on which prints are hung and changed from time to time (photo L).

Then and now There have been changes and new initiatives but I think someone leaving in the '80s and rejoining now would find a lot the same.

There was massive change when Whickham, along with most of the club world ditched film, but longer-term I think this has had more impact on the nature of the imagery than the way in which the club operates. Whickham have always had women members and more over the years, but they have remained a minority. There have been changes in the programme. There are less 'travelogues' when members take a set of slides on a holiday abroad. Foreign holidays became a norm and TV brings superb quality documentaries into our homes.

Twice each season Whickham's programme included practical portrait evenings when members brought their cameras, the lights were set up and a model or two provided. We have less competition nights both internally and externally. For many years we hosted about three 'open evening' for visiting speakers from out of the area to share their work, "big nights" as they were known. Over the years we have increased the opportunities for members to share their work. Currently there are far more in-house nights but this is partly a response to financial challenges caused by inflation and a fall in membership post Covid.

Whickham is still among the cheapest clubs in the Federation, not the lowest fees but when you have paid your money that is it – no weekly extras except the teas.

Ashington CC swept the board and were congratulated on their win and also for gaining the highest score for their members in both sections of the competition.




The trophy was presented to the Print Competition Secretary, Gordon Hartill. Thanks were also given to Stephen Fowler for judging the competition.



Gateshead's exhibition is part of the charity's Light up a Life Remembrance Service.









Dalston Photographic Society

A new name for the Northern Counties list of clubs, but not a new club. By Richard Speirs



Morton Photographic Society, in the Western Area, at their AGM in April decided to change their name to reflect their new location in the village of Dalston, a few miles to the South of their previous location at Morton Manor in Carlisle.

So why the change?

The Society was originally established by former members of Carlisle Camera Club in the early 1960's. We aren't exactly sure when they held their first meeting, but it was probably the 1963/1964 season.

The Society's name came from the venue they started off in and continued to use until Covid restrictions came into force. That venue was Morton Manor, a

former stately home donated to the City of Carlisle for Community use by a well know mill owner.

It served the club well for nearly 60 years, however, when Covid restrictions were lifted many members were reluctant to return to the rather cramped and unventilated room we had been using for so long.

One club member was aware that the nearby village of Dalston had spent a considerable amount of money on a complete renovation of their Village Hall, so a visit was arranged.

The club committee was impressed by the size of rooms available, accessible parking and the presence of state-of-the-art lighting, heating and in-built back projection facilities on offer at an affordable price. Accordingly, bookings were made and Morton PS has been there now for 2 years. Many members thought that as we no longer had any affiliation with Morton a name change would be very appropriate.

The Society has been made very welcome in Dalston and we have participated in a number of events and wish to be more closely involved with the Community so the name change was voted on and agreed.

The name has now changed and Our new venue is the Victory Hall, The Green, Dalston, Carlisle CA5 7QB




